Eligibility Requirements

Basis for acceptance will include a review by our Acceptance Review Committee.

This is a program for students with a diagnosis of Developmental Disability or Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Students must be between age 17-22 and must be able to perform self-help skills independently.

Students will be prioritized as follows:

- 1) Top priority will be given to students who have already been accepted into a college and will begin in the 2011-12 school year, or those already enrolled in college but need to increase their college skills.
- 2) Second priority will be given to high school seniors or others planning to attend college this school year.
- 3) Third prior will be given to high school juniors.
